ACCESS Fall Block Term French II Description: French at its second level is designed to build upon the skills acquired in French I. Using these skills, more emphasis will be placed on the higher-level development of communication skills, reading comprehension, and composition. Many activities will aim also for the further exploration of the practices, perspectives, and relationships of the target culture. Geography, along with accomplishments in French literature and art will gain in-depth attention. The student will be given the opportunity to experience the target culture first-hand through situations beyond the classroom such as plays and trips.

Course Dates: Start Date August 21st, 2013 End Date December 20th, 2013

Goals and Objectives: The Grades 9-12 Modern Languages curriculum as per the AL Course of Study provides students with a four-year continuum of study in a modern language. The content standards for the curriculum are organized within the five goal areas of language education- Communication, Cultures, Connections, Comparisons, and Communities.

- 1.) Use the target language in oral and written form in the past time frame, including giving and responding to a series of commands, asking and answering questions, providing directions and instructions, and stating preferences and opinions to interact in a variety of situations.
- 2.) Interpret spoken and written authentic target language materials and information on familiar topics.

- 3.) Create oral and written presentations in the target language about a variety of topics using familiar and newly acquired vocabulary words and phrases and correct structure in the past time frame.
- 4.) Recite from memory skits, poems, short narratives, or songs in the target language, using appropriate pronunciation and intonation.
- 5.) Describe practices within the cultures where the target language is spoken.
- 6.) Explain the influences of geography on a target culture, including food, clothing, dwellings, transportation, and the arts.
- 7.) Compare information common to other school subjects and to the target language
- 8.) Compare vocabulary usage, grammatical structures, and idiomatic expressions of a target language with English.
- 9.) Compare traditions and social conventions of a target culture to one's own
- 10.) Describe typical activities and events of a target culture.
- 11.) Communicate in a variety of ways with speakers of the target language on topics of interest

A final goal is that interest in learning the language continues beyond the AL advanced diploma requirement to engage students in continuing their language study with levels III or IV or to begin the study of a second foreign language.

Requirements: Students enrolled in Level II must have successfully completed Level I and possess a novice-low to a novice-mid level of proficiency.

While foreign language classes are fun and interesting, we strongly encourage students to take the class as an advanced elective. (Foreign language classes are the stepping stone to an advanced diploma.) Students should remember the class is fast-paced and will require study time outside of class. *Please see related study hints link in "CONTENT."
